The Gospel in Galatians

• The gospel is...

...the forgiveness of sins acquired for us by <u>Christ</u>, given to us by <u>grace</u>, and received by <u>faith</u> that gives us <u>freedom</u>.

Problem that Motivated the Letter

- Jewish-Christian missionaries (Judaizers) from Jerusalem asserted Paul was wrong.
 - Paul advocated for a gospel-alone path to salvation.
 - Judaizers advocated for a gospel-plus path to salvation.

Faith Brings Freedom

"It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery."

(Gal 5:1 NIV)

Faith Brings Freedom

- Malady—return to the uncertainty that attends a gospel-plus path to salvation
- Remedy—embrace the gospelalone path to salvation that brings freedom from uncertainty



The Yoke of Slavery

- The Roman world was highly stratified and class conscious with slaves occupying the lowest rung of the social ladder.
- Roman slaves comprised 16-20% of the population of the Roman Empire—typically war captives, debtors, or children of slaves.
- Aristotle called them "living tools." They could be laborers, managers, educators, physicians, accountants, and sea captains.
- They were subject to the absolute power of their owners experiencing a kind of "social death" that took away their autonomy and certainty.

Spiritual Slavery

- A gospel-plus theology creates a slave-like life of obligation and uncertainty, because one can never be sure they have contributed enough to assure their salvation.
- The net effect of this theology is to make Christ of no value (5:2).

Spiritual Freedom

 A gospel-alone theology brings freedom from uncertainty, because it fully depends on what Christ has done for me.

"For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision has any value. The only thing that counts is faith expressing itself through love."

(Gal 5:6 NIV)



Faith Brings the Freedom to Live in Love


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- This is What Counts—gospel-alone reprise (6:11-18)

Personal Outburst

"As for those agitators, I wish they would go the whole way and emasculate themselves!" (Gal 5:12 NIV)

Personal Outburst

- An emotion-filled outburst of lightly connected thoughts.
- Illustrates how passionately Paul felt about this topic and how personally he took the Galatian defection.





Personal Outburst

- Foot race metaphor (5:7)
- Criticism of Paul's common-speak in a world that championed rhetorical flourish (5:8)
- Baking metaphor that highlights exponential growth and harm (5:9)
- Making the gentile quandary worse! (5:10-11)

 Circumcision made it difficult for gentiles to become Jewish proselytes and the cross made it difficult for gentiles to become Christians.
- Crude concluding jab taken at the Judaizers (5:12)



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Faith
Expresses
Itself in Love

"You, my brothers and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve one another humbly in love."

(Gal 5:13 NIV)

Faith Expresses Itself in Love

- Malady—following the lead of the old nature (flesh) into a life of sin
- Remedy—follow the new nature (Spirit) and express your faith in acts of love

Justification and Sanctification

Justification

- Speaks of our legal status before God.
- Is a permanent condition.
- DONE for us.
- Sanctification
 - Speaks of our moral status in this world.
 - Is an evolving condition.
 - Is a cooperative DOING motivated by our justification, empowered by the Spirit, and guided by the law.





With eternal consequences


Acts guided by the Spirit (5:22-26)

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Faith Persists in Love

"Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers."

(Gal 6:9-10 NIV)

Faith Persists in Love

- Malady—surrendering the fight to live in love when things get difficult
- Remedy—lean on the Spirit and one another to energize our persistence





Challenges

- Spiritual hubris that prevents us from showing love to those caught in sin (6:1)
- Rabid individualism fueled by conceit that prevents us from helping others (6:2-4)
- Unhealthy dependence on the goodwill of others (6:5-6)
- Assuming we can game the system (6:7-8)



Our Choice Matters

"Whoever sows to please their flesh, from the flesh will reap destruction; whoever sows to please the Spirit, from the Spirit will reap eternal life." (Gal 6:8 NIV)

The Peril of Persistent Sin

- Faith brings eternal salvation.
- Sin is doubt—the opposite of faith.
- Doubt in its most mature form is unbelief.
- Unbelief brings eternal condemnation.






